Trip Reports

MASTERTON WALK 16 MARCH

We met at the SWWC at 8.30 and exchanged our extreme sadness following the horrific shootings at two Christchurch Mosques, where one man killed 50 people and injured at least 40 others, sharing our disbelief that this could occur in NZ and sympathy for all those in Christchurch.

We began the walk through the Millennium Reserve on Hillcrest Street. It is a very well maintained walkway, with the added bonus of a lake and plenty of ducks. We then walked southwest along Ranfurly Street to the showgrounds and had morning tea under a very old tree next to the grandstand, which was built around 1911. We went back to the cars and drove to Henley Lake, first stopping at Garland Reserve on McKenna Street, a lovely little reserve with enormous kahikiteas and podacarp. Only Juliet knew of this reserve where she holidayed as a young child, in the house next to the walkway. Great memories Juliet.

Henley Lake is a wonderful asset to Masterton and is a credit to those who plant and maintain this area. A few too many muscovy ducks, but some lovely white swans. We finished our walk around midday and headed home. An easy walk enjoyed by Barry and Lynne, Faye, Juliet, Rosie and Ian.
