Hans Kolinko took up tramping and hunting in the Tararuas after migrating to New Zealand from Austria in 1965. In 1972 he joined the New Zealand Forest Service, and spent much of his time working in the Tararuas.

Hans built or helped to build several of the huts that trampers use: Tutuwai, Tōtara Flats (since replaced), Te Matawai, Jumbo and Alpha. As well, he repaired and maintained many other huts, and

helped to develop and maintain road-end facilities. Other projects included the Tararua Peaks ladder and a bridge across the Tauwharenīkau River.

Hans turned 90 on 24 June 2024. We congratulate him, thank him for his work and wish him good health and a continued happy retirement.

Trip Reports

IN SEARCH OF A STUMP A combined MTC / SWTC trip, 26 May

SWTC participation in this trip had two main objectives:

- to find a moss- and fern-covered stump that an SWTC member had noticed on a previous trip but couldn't photograph owing to the party's excessive speed;
- to see Punanga Recreation Reserve.

Breaks for rest, tea, and refreshment were adequate. The first was at the lookout after an abrupt 300 metre climb, where a phone took this photograph of Nathan, Margaret, Josh and Nigel.



Everyone kept a sharp eye, but the remembered stump proved elusive. The best we found was this:



An orchid, *Earina autumnalis*, was a consolation prize.



After descending to Gentle Annie Saddle we climbed to Carrington Ridge and lunched beside this sign, painted and placed by the late Ron Brown.



Almost back at the car park, we came to Punanga Recreation Reserve, an area of about 0.16 hectare that in 2017 was vested in the trustees of Rangitāne Tu Mai Rā, a post-settlement governance entity representing Rangitāne o Wairarapa and Rangitāne o Tamaki nui-ā-Rua.



As part of the same settlement, a statutory acknowledgement and deed of recognition reflect the ancient association of the Tararua Range with Rangitāne to both east and west of the Tararua Range, renaming Mitre as Pukeamoamo / Mitre and Jumbo as Pukeahurangi / Jumbo.


Then on via the Firebreak track and Station Drive to the railway station for lunch. We had a look at an enormous new subdivision, but none of the sections tempted anyone.
